RECOVERY ACT IN WISCONSIN

Total Jobs & Spending

- <u>JOBS CREATED AND SAVED</u> CEA estimates that <u>63,000</u> jobs were created or saved by the Recovery Act in Wisconsin through June, 2010.
- <u>TOTAL SPEND</u> More than \$6.7 billion in Recovery funds has been made available to Wisconsin and more than \$4.6 billion has already been spent.

Investing in Infrastructure

- <u>CONSTRUCTION</u> Over \$692 million has been obligated for <u>463 transportation projects</u> in Wisconsin.
- <u>SMALL BUSINESS</u> <u>2,391 Recovery Act-backed small business loans</u> have been given to Wisconsin small businesses, supporting more than \$941 million in lending.

Relief to Individuals

- <u>TAX RELIEF</u> Because of the Making Work Pay tax credit, 2.2 million Wisconsin working families will collectively receive \$1.2 billion in tax relief.
- <u>UNEMPLOYMENT BENEFITS</u> More than 730,000 Wisconsin residents have expanded unemployment benefits because of the Recovery Act.
- <u>STIMULUS PAYMENTS</u> More than 1 million Wisconsin seniors, veterans and other high-need residents have received one-time economic relief payments of \$250, totaling over \$255 million.

Helping States

- <u>TEACHERS</u> More than <u>9,300 education positions</u> were reported as funded by the Recovery Act in Q2 2010 in Wisconsin which has received more than \$876 million in State Fiscal Stabilization Funds (SFSF).
- <u>MEDICAID</u> The Recovery Act has already made more than \$1.2 billion available to help prevent Medicaid cuts in Wisconsin. The state of Wisconsin has spent more than \$1 billion of the available funds.
- <u>'COPS' PROGRAM GRANTS</u>: Law enforcement agencies in Wisconsin received over \$12.1 million in funding to support 58 police officers' salaries and benefits for three years.

RECOVERY ACT FUNDING IN MILWAUKEE AND THE SURROUNDING AREA

Milwaukee and the surrounding area have received approximately **\$572 million** in Recovery Act funding. Highlights included below:

- The City of Milwaukee received Energy Efficiency and Conservation Block Grants of over \$5.8 million. An additional \$732,400 was provided to Milwaukee County.
- Johnson Controls, Inc, of Milwaukee, received nearly \$300 million from the Department of Energy for battery manufacturing projects.
- ZBB Energy Corporation received a \$1.3 million State Energy Program grant to expand the manufacturing capabilities at their Menomonee Falls battery facility. These advanced flow zinc bromide batteries can store energy from a variety of renewable energy sources such as wind, solar, and hydroelectric. The award is part of the State of Wisconsin's \$55.5 million State Energy Program to support clean energy manufacturing and the transformation of their industrial sector.
- The Department of Transportation provided over \$83 million in funding to the County of Milwaukee, including over \$12 million for airports, \$27 million for transit, and \$44 million for highways and bridges.
- The Small Business Administration (SBA) provided nearly \$44 million to businesses in Milwaukee. Loan recipients include Becker Design (\$100,000), Big Apple Bagel (\$90,000), and GIA Medical, LLC (\$300,000).
 - Additionally, Lincoln Neighborhood Redevelopment Corp and Wisconsin Women's Business Initiative Corp received SBA-backed microloans of \$750,000 apiece. Microloans establish or expand revolving loan funds that help start new small businesses or expand existing ones.
- The Department of Education provided over \$23 million in Work-Study and Pell Grants for higher education in Milwaukee. Recipients include Alverno College, Marquette University, and Milwaukee Area Technical College.
- The Milwaukee Housing Authority was the recipient of nearly \$18 million from the Department of Housing and Urban Development. The grants were distributed through the Public Housing Capital Fund.
 - o In addition, the City of Milwaukee received nearly \$7 million for homelessness prevention programs, \$4.5 million for community development programs and a grant of nearly \$1 million for healthy homes.
- Milwaukee Area Workforce Investment Board received a grant of nearly \$100,000 to be used for training in high growth and emerging industry sectors.
- The Environmental Protection Agency provided the Redevelopment Authority of Milwaukee with \$850,000 for the assessment and clean-up of brownfields in the area.
