The Copyright Alliance has informed me of the welcome invitation from the Obama Administration to share my thoughts on my rights as a creator. My name is Jordan and I'm writing from Chicago, IL where I attend Columbia College majoring in music business. My plans as a student and artist will include being employed in the music industry with hopes of a publishing career, which without Copyright Law and protection would be a dead or dying field (not to say the industry isn't going that direction already). I believe that intellectual property rights and copyrights are important for the same reason that they always have been and that is to enrich the public domain and stir future creativity. We must protect our songwriters and performers so as to ensure further advancement of music and to ensure that these people can make a living doing something they happen to be pretty good at. This is why I agree with the penalties and consequences of piracy and copyright infringement through the PRO-IP act.

I am soon to be a graduate of Columbia College and will be working in the music industry soon thereafter. This is what makes the PRO-IP act so important to me. However, I do feel that current penalties for an average individual should be based on a percentage of the individual's assets or salary. It can be financially crippling/devastating to the average man or woman to be taken to court and sued for a large sum of money for something he or she really didn't have to work that hard to get.
