In the internet age it is often difficult to determine what artist, photographer, videographer or writer created works that are posted on sites that may or may not intentionally strip copyright metadata from their works. It seems that no artistic or literary masterpiece is sacrosanct. With computer cut-and-paste technology, anybody can claim virtually any artistic creation as their own. All to many times I have seen this happen to my own photography.

This poses a disaster for anyone who depends upon the copyrighted value of their work for future revenue. Orphan Works legislation is a thinly-disguised theft of the production of our nation's greatest creative minds for the benefit of corporations that would be worth nothing without the value of that creativity. Once copyright data is stripped from an image or a manuscript, it can be difficult or impossible for any future user to make "reasonable efforts" to track down the creator.
